ESSENTIALS OF APARTMENT SEARCH

- Be aware of your rights, but *DO NOT threaten to call a lawyer if you have a problem*, remain polite. You can always consult with legal assistance if there is a problem, without telling the potential landlord that you will.
- There is no guarantee; you may end up calling several places that are already filled, **DO NOT GET DISCOURAGED**.
- Always be polite and friendly, you are selling yourself, as someone the potential landlord will have to deal with.
- Do not get upset if the person you are dealing with is not polite.
- Ask about waiting lists if there is no apartment available.
- The number of bedrooms may not be accurate; a one bedroom may actually have a smaller room that can be used as a bedroom.
- Weekly rent X 52 / 12 = monthly rent. For example:
\$125 per week x 52 = \$6500 / 12 = \$542 per month
- Always look at a place before signing a lease
- If you do not have section 8, you can put more than one person in each bedroom. Sleeping arrangements are up to you.
- *DO NOT tell a potential landlord you live in a homeless shelter. You can inform them, "I'm staying with friends."*
- References: put down people who will give you a good reference, give them a call to confirm.

FRIENDLY ADVICE

- **DO NOT** rent storage; you often end up spending more than your belongings are worth. Instead, consider selling your belongings.
- It is easier to move to the apartment of your dreams from another apartment than from a shelter. Do not be too particular when leaving the shelter.
- Do not rule out other neighboring communities, rents may be slightly lower.

APARTMENT SEARCH JARGON LIST

- **No utilities, separate utilities, tenant utilities, + utls:** These phrases all mean that you (the tenant) would have to pay for the utilities (heat, hot water, electric)
- **D/D:** The apartment has a dishwasher and disposal
- **W&D:** The apartment has a washer and drier
- **W&D Hookup:** You can put a washer and drier into the apartment when you move in at your own cost.
- **1.5 Ba:** The apartment has one full bathroom (with a shower, tub, toilet and sink) and ½ bathroom (with a toilet and sink)
- **A/C:** The apartment has air conditioning
- **C/A:** The apartment has central air conditioning
- **Month to month tenancy at will:** The landlord or the tenant (you) can decide to break the lease (decide you need to move out) with a 30 days notice (if it is specified in the lease it may be as little as a weeks notice)
- **Cr Chk:** Credit check
- **Cr Ref:** Credit reference
- **Flr:** Floor
- **Bdrm:** Bedroom
- **Lrg:** Large
- **Sm:** Small
- **Prk:** Parking
- **Avail:** Available
- **Off St.:** There is off street parking available
- **Sec Dep; Sec:** Security deposit (usually one months rent, which the landlord can deduct damage to the apartment from)

APARTMENT SEARCH TIPS

1. GET INFORMATION:

- a. Use landlord list in this Toolkit.
- b. Get listing of available apartments from daily newspapers available at the shelter, in the office of the Nashua Soup Kitchen & Shelter, Front Door Agency, or at the Library
- c. Drive or walk around the neighborhoods you are interested in
 - Look for “FOR RENT” signs or empty-looking apartments.
 - Check with other residents of a building you are interested in or neighbors if they are readily available (outdoors) to see what the possibilities are for a particular apartment.
- d. Talk to people: at work, at meetings, in your present neighborhood for ideas.
- e. Look at bulletin boards in Laundromats, corner stores, at work or school.

2. BE AVAILABLE:

When you call a landlord or rental agency, *tell them your name and why you are calling*. Be sure you have a telephone number to give them where they can reach you or leave a message. This could be your own number if you have one, that of a relative or friend, your place of work, a neighbor, co-worker, etc. Please indicate a time that is best to reach someone at the number you give or let him or her know if there is an answering machine.

3. PROMOTE YOURSELF:

Typically, your potential landlord will not know about you and may be meeting with several potential tenants other than yourself. It is your job to promote yourself. Think about your good qualities and do not be afraid to share them. If you are clean, quiet, and/or have a history of paying rent on time, make sure to let them know. If you are employed and/or have section 8, let the landlord know immediately.

4. SECURITY DEPOSIT ASSISTANCE:

Once you have found an apartment and can prove you have enough income to support it, you may contact community agencies such as the *Front Door Agency* (886-2866) to inquire about a security deposit loan. ***Please allow time for necessary paperwork to be completed and processed.***

Walk-In Basis – NO ADDRESS REQUIRED TO APPLY **Ten Wrong Reasons we did not apply for Food Stamps**

- 1. “I was working, and I thought working people weren’t eligible.”** Actually, when I finally applied I found out that 20% of working age food stamps recipients’ work. Half of them work full-time, but like me, they did not earn enough money to make ends meet.
- 2. “I had no children living with me.”** My daughter Amy was with her father for 6 months.” The truth is that I could have applied for food stamps whether Amy lived with me or not.
- 3. “I wasn’t on welfare.”** I did not know that food stamps have nothing to do with welfare. Food stamps are about proper nutrition for Americans.
- 4. “I owned a car.”** You know what I learned? I could own a car and still be eligible for food stamps. Cars count against a 2,000 cashable asset limit only after discounting the first \$4,650 in fair market value. Cars do not count at all if you have less than \$1,000 in equity, and some cars, such as those used to transport disabled household members, do not count at all.
- 5. “I had no address.”** The reason Amy lived with her father for six months was that I was homeless. I did not need a living or mailing address to receive food stamps. The food stamp office will help you work around homelessness.
- 6. “I heard people say I would only get \$10 a month in food stamps.”** I learned that the amount of food stamps you receive depends on your income and expenses. The maximum food stamps allotment for a household size of two is \$234.
- 7. “People in the store would see me using food stamps”** Not true. New Hampshire provides benefits on debit cards that look like any other credit card or bankcard.
- 8. “I own my own house.”** I am having a hard time making the payments right now, but thank goodness, Amy and I can own our own house and still receive food stamps. Neither my house nor its furnishings count as cashable assets towards the \$2,000 cashable limits. Countable cashable assets are limited to things like savings bonds, saving/checking accounts, and second homes.
- 9. “I couldn’t live with anyone else, like my mother or a friend.”** Now I know that you can live with anyone you want to. Unless you live with your spouse, children, or close relatives, other people in your household aren’t required to be part of your food stamp case, and their income won’t count towards your income limit, unless you normally purchase and prepare meals together.
- 10. “I voluntarily quit my job.”** It was not smart, but then my old car broke down and I had no transportation to work. I did not know that if you voluntarily quit your job, you would not be eligible for food stamps for two months, except when you have good reason like I did. Apply now even if you quit your job because your family may be eligible right away, even if you are not. Do not forget, though, these are food stamp rules, not unemployment insurance rules.

Environmental Health (603) 589-4530

Property Maintenance Issues for the City of Nashua *(Surrounding towns may have their own requirements.)*

For EMERGENCY building maintenance issues such as:

- Sewer waste coming out of toilets or into basement,
- Lack of running water or no hot water,
- No electricity, faulty or exposed wiring,
- Leaks in the gas lines and/or defective appliances supplied by landlord,
- Leaking roof and/or collapsed ceiling,
- Heating facilities are not safe or do not adequately heat all livable rooms and bathrooms to an average temperature of at least 65 degrees Fahrenheit.

****Contact the landlord and the Nashua Housing Code Enforcement office at 589-3100.**

For NON-EMERGENCY building maintenance issues such as:

- Falling plaster from walls or ceilings,
- Large holes in floors, walls or ceilings,
- Porches, stairs, or railings are not structurally sound,
- Not enough trash barrels to store trash between collections,
- Windows do not open, remain opened, and/or do not fit their frames properly,
- Exterior doors are not weather tight,
- Insects or rodents are present,
- Smoke detectors do not operate.

***Prior to contacting Code Enforcement, tenants must contact the landlord first by calling and writing a letter to the landlord (tenant should keep a copy of letter) and allow two weeks for landlord to respond. If no response, send copy of letter to the Nashua Housing Code Enforcement office at 229 Main Street, Nashua, NH 03061. Code Enforcement cannot take action without proper notification having been given to the landlord.**

For work being done on the premises without a permit from the City of Nashua, contact the Nashua Building Safety at 589-3080.

For health issues such as lead paint poisoning, mold, infestations, etc. contact the Nashua Environmental Health Department at 589-4530.

Eviction Process

It is recommended to seek legal counsel for any questions related to the legality of your eviction

Landlord/Tenant Writ

In order to evict, a landlord must always follow the correct procedure and in most situations must prove that there is good cause to evict. The tenant must be given written notice and may ask for a court hearing.

Written Notice:

Demand for Rent - If the landlord is evicting a tenant for not paying the rent, a **demand for rent**, is the first notice given. The notice tells the tenant how much rent you owe, and cannot ask for more rent than actually owed. The demand must be served personally (handed to the tenant) or left at tenant's home.

Notice to Quit - in all evictions the landlord must serve the tenant with a **notice to quit**. This is the actual eviction notice, and must be in writing and served personally or is left at tenant's door (A sheriff does not have to serve it.)

Written Notices must state specific reason for the eviction;

Give you at least 7-day notice to leave if the reason for the eviction is due to: nonpayment of rent; tenant behavior that has harmed the safety of other tenants or the landlord; or tenant has caused substantial damage to the premises;

Give you at least 30-day notice to leave in all other cases; tell the **right to cure**, if the eviction is for nonpayment of rent. The **right to cure** means that the tenant can avoid eviction by payment of all back rent due – plus \$15 and applicable late fees - by the date the notice to quit expires. If the tenant pays in time, the tenant can defeat the eviction and does not have to move. Tenants can only cure three times in a 12-month period.

If a landlord fails to take any of the steps described above, a tenant can ask the court to dismiss the eviction.
